1.2 UNDERSTANDING WORKS OF ART, CONTINUED

The Scourge Vanquished by Shawn Cheng

Fig. 1-9 mimics the look and feel of comic book art. Before about 1950, fine art and comic art were considered separate realms. But an art movement called Pop Art started to change people's attitudes about comic art. Today, new digital drawing techniques and the sophisticated imagery and storylines of graphic novels have helped comic art gain acceptance as a fine art in its own right. Many comic artists now produce paintings, drawings, and prints that they exhibit and sell.

24. When viewing a book with a two-page spread, you can use **View As** to select a single-page view.



25. The **Zoom Slider** can magnify the page up to 300%. Click and drag the slide bar or use the plus and minus buttons to increase or decrease the zoom.

30. To return to the My Books page, click **All Books**.



Media Pane

31. Some Books include a **Media Pane** with access to enlarged versions of the Fine Art images. In the Student edition, the **Media Pane** will automatically open when enlarged images are available.





32. Click the **Hide** button to hide the Media pane and increase the size of the book.



33. To view a single image at full size, click the thumbnail in the Media Pane.



From there, you can magnify the image up to 300% with the zoom controls.





34. You can hide the Artist Name, Title, and image information by clicking **Hide Image Details.**







35. If the page features more than one fine art image, click **Slideshow** to view them in a full-screen slideshow.



36. In some books. videos also appear in the Media Pane. Click the play icon in the pane to watch the video.





The video will open as a pop-up that can be expanded to full screen. Hover over the video to see the video controls: Play/Pause, Volume and Full Screen.
